Three major, cycling infrastructure projects from our campaign "asks" implemented between Autumn 2014 and 2016.
Negotiations underway with the council to deliver an innovative "zonal" solution for the whole of South Islington.
ICAG representatives now meeting with Councillors and Planners on a regular basis.

Cyclists' views being listened to and acted upon by journalists, Councillors and MPs, with letters and articles in the local press. Packed out cycling events and member participation at all time high.

# PROJECT UPDATES IN

The Archway Gyratory: At last, after years of campaigning by Better Archway Forum, Streets for People, ICAG and others, we will finally be meeting with Council Officers in early September to see the latest plans that have been drawn up. They should go out to public consultation in October. Although implementation is unlikely before Spring 2016, when the bridge works at Upper Holloway are complete, it feels amazing that this may finally happen. One campaigner from Better Archway Forum has been working on this for more than a decade! This is a true "water on a stone" story proving that tenacity and a consistent, but persistent approach, read benefits.

Jeremy Corbyn MP Islington North, has been a fervent supporter of a safer solution to the Archway Gyratory for cyclists and pedestrians, for many years. His most recent response to member, Tom Bogdanowicz, on the urgent need for lorry driver compulsory pedestrian/cyclist awareness training dovetails with this. See website for details

**7 Sisters Road:** We are still pushing for a more cycle- and pedestrian-friendly scheme than the options put forward by TfL last winter, and are championing the ideas developed by Tom Harrison and colleagues. We feel strongly that, in contrast to TfL's plans, it's necessary to segregate Seven Sisters Road and have put forward two comparative schemes: two single lanes on both sides of the road, and one bidirectional lane on the south side. We are working with Camden Cyclists on this gritty problem and will share ideas with a new local initiative, Transform 7 Sisters (@t7sisters) that's campaigning for safer roads, better access to businesses and a general rejuvenation of this very busy commercial centre. As the proverb says, better to go further, and go together...

#### "Clerkenwell Boulevard":

Clerkenwell Road is recognised by TfL as one of the most important sections of Central London's Grid. Protected cycle tracks are needed to enable attractive cycling safe from traffic and buses. ICAG proposes to Convert Clerkenwell Road into the Clerkenwell Boulevard.

Taking this campaign to the next level, ICAG supporters led by ICAG activist, Andrea Casolotti, staged direct action on 4th August and commandeered half the pavement at Clerkenwell. "We wanted to draw attention to an unfinished and unused cycle path at Clerkenwell and how it could provide safety for cyclists at a time when we put our lives in danger on London's roads," Andrea said. Cllr Claudia Webbe Executive Member for Transport and Environment, set out Islington's support and plans for new cycling infrastructure in the borough in a recent letter in the Islington Tribune (15/8/14), and specifically referred to the Clerkenwell Road project being implemented by 2016. This is a huge success for ICAG's vision for cycling in the borough and now we have to keep up the dialogue, and the pressure, to make sure it's as good as possible and as near to the original vision.

# OTHER AREAS IN THE SPOTLIGHT:

**St John's Road:** Since Crossrail's closure of the south end of St John's Street/Charterhouse Street, this area has turned organically into a piazza style space for local residents, businesses and visitors. ICAG has requested that Islington Council Planners survey local stakeholders about making this new infrastructure permanent, and not to re-open St John's Street. It would certainly fit perfectly with the Clerkenwell Boulevard scheme that has won approval. Another win in the making perhaps?

# AIR POLLUTION

Islington's new Labour administration seems to have woken up to the fact that its responsibility to manage 93% of our roads and its responsibility for public health are two sides of the same coin. On 1st August they launched a new initiative to combat air pollution. With immediate effect, drivers allowing their engine to idle will be fined on the spot. #### **PARKING DEBATE IGNITES!**

The news that the Council plans to introduce 884 new parking spaces in the borough - contradicting completely their transport and air pollution objectives - has ignited passionate debate among ICAG members. From proposals to boycott Islington shops, to forming an Anti Parking lobby, a letter from Islington South's MP Emily Thornberry to the Council demanding an explanation, to more pragmatic proposals based on filtering with low-cost bollards, the heated discussion has raged for over a month since activist Andrea Casolotti's open letter to Cllr Webbe appeared in the local press. Cllr Caroline Russell (Green Party) commented: "When the council uses obscure policies (that seem to contradict their transport objectives) to increase parking capacity, which is bad for cycling and bad for public health, then I'm glad to see ICAG speak out".

A note of caution was sounded by LCC Board Member, Mustafa Arif: "Don't forget back in 2006 the Lib Dems out-numbered Labour by 3:1. Islington was one of their flagship councils. It's easy to forget in these Coalition days, but the Lib Dem demise locally started with the unpopularity (with a limited, but electorally significant, number of swing voters) of CPZs. I don't think asking turkeys to vote for Christmas is good campaigning. Politics is the art of the possible. There's plenty to get done. Over time (declining car ownership, rising cycling, evolving demographics, and passage of certain obstructive personalities) the facts on the ground will change. Right now, let's focus on what we can get done to the highest standard to maximise the increase in bums on saddles. That doesn't ignore car parking but I do think ICAG should be saying things like "Quietyway XX needs to be really good and these parking spaces here are a problem, here are the acceptable option(s)" rather than what may seem like a general assault on the principle of car parking." Bikeweek 2014, 14/22 June
